Bishop Creighton House

Bishop Creighton House has provided community and social support services for the people of Hammersmith & Fulham since 1908. We aim to help people live safe, healthy and independent lives, tackling some of the problems caused by disadvantage and social isolation. We run a community centre and a range of projects for older people, people with learning disabilities and families with young children.

For most of the year 2019/20, our services operated as normal. In March 2020, the Covid-19 pandemic began to have an adverse effect on some projects and their funding. Our services adapted well, offering more telephone and video befriending, food deliveries and prescription collections and after thorough risk assessments, we resumed practical work in clients' homes. We were able to access 'Covid-specific' monies from a number of funding bodies to help with this essential work. We had to close the Community Centre in March and we reopened with restrictions in August, in line with NHS and Health & Safety Executive guidance.

Working with Orsini-Brewin Architects, we have finalised plans for a redeveloped Community Centre, which will improve access for people with disabilities and provide new studios and workshops. We are grateful to The Band Trust, who awarded us a very generous grant in June 2020, which will enable us to transform the basement and ground floor of the building. We expect work to start in early 2021.

In these difficult times, Bishop Creighton House offers vital services for the most vulnerable and continues to promote independence: from enabling people to make friendships, develop their interests and find work; to helping them feel safe and secure at home, avoiding residential care.

Community Centre

The Community Centre is open seven days a week from 9am until 10pm, providing opportunities for people of all ages to come together for educational, cultural and social purposes. Throughout the year, the Centre hosted nearly 1000 events and activities, from drama and music to yoga and self-help. In addition, we let office space to charitable and private organisations. The Centre was closed during the early months of the pandemic.

Learning Disability Outreach

LDO (formerly Mentoring Plus) works with adults with learning disabilities, helping them gain new skills, build friendships and enjoy social gatherings, undertake paid or voluntary work and training opportunities and enhance their physical and emotional wellbeing. The project offers a range of activities and support, including: mentoring; employment support; literacy and numeracy classes; educational workshops; health and wellbeing activities such as tai chi; and numerous social events. The project supported 109 people with learning disabilities and worked with 29 volunteers, some working one-to-one, others offering group or creative mentoring. During the pandemic lockdown, the service increased phone and video contact with service users, providing emotional support and advice and meeting people in a distanced way where possible.

Homeline

Homeline's staff and volunteers provide long-term befriending services, helping to reduce isolation and loneliness for over 230 older people. The project acts as a safety net, identifying problems before they become a crisis. In the year, Homeline had 112 active volunteers who made over 20,000 telephone befriending calls (including weekends and bank holidays) and made regular home visits to over 80 people. Staff carried out over 900 pieces of casework and advocacy for members experiencing problems and needing additional support. Staff sent a quarterly newsletter to over 250 people and hosted 18 social events with supported transport and ran weekly IT and exercise classes. Homeline was at the forefront of the pandemic response in H&F, helping more people than ever before with phone and video calls, food deliveries and prescription collections.

Keep Active Hammersmith & Fulham/ Kensington & Chelsea

KA H&F is a volunteer delivered project, run in partnership with H&F NHS Rehabilitation Services, helping older people back to fitness after a fall or illness. Trained volunteers are matched with older people and visit them weekly for up to nine weeks to help them become mobile again. In the year, 29 volunteers assisted 98 clients. KA K&C is based on the well-established H&F service and is run on similar lines, but on a smaller scale. In the year, 14 volunteers supported 41 clients.

My mobility is so much better thanks to Keep Active. I think about my volunteer a lot as she listened to me and was very patient. Keep Active Westminster

KAW is run in partnership with the NHS Community Independence Service and provides support to older people after a period of intensive input from health care professionals following a fall or illness. On discharge from hospital, many older people are unable to continue their home exercise or mobility programme due to lack of motivation and social isolation. Their risk of falls and other health complications is high. Trained volunteers are matched with older people and visit them weekly for up to nine weeks to help them become mobile again. In the year, 90 people were referred to the service and there were 33 active volunteers.

Care & Repair

Care & Repair promotes independent living by providing practical advice and support to help older and disabled people adapt their homes so they can live independently. We can organise any type of adaptation, including level access showers, stair-lifts, ramps, kitchens and automated doors. Our involvement takes away much of the worry and anxiety associated with building work in the home and helps to ease concerns about cowboy builders. We ensure our approved contractors complete work to a good standard. To fund the costs involved, we also apply for any grants a client may be eligible for. This year we adapted 49 homes.

Safer Homes

Safer Homes offers home security and safety equipment installation and advice to older and disabled people, families with children under five and people who have experienced domestic violence, burglary or hate crime. In the year, the project visited 257 households, fitting 854 pieces of equipment, carried out 130 small jobs for paying customers and fitted draught-proofing in 32 homes. The social business arm of Safer Homes was successful in raising over £19,000 during the year which was reinvested in the project.
