Bishop Creighton House

BCH has provided community and social support services for the people of Hammersmith & Fulham for 108 years. We aim to help people live safe, healthy and independent lives, tackling some of the problems caused by disadvantage and social isolation. We run a community centre and a range of projects for older people, people with learning disabilities and families with young children.

We further developed our services over the year. Long established projects continued to thrive and we received funding for two new services. H & F Connect 55+ is a new service, funded by the London Borough of Hammersmith & Fulham, offering befriending to older people. Building on the highly regarded Keep Active project in Hammersmith & Fulham, we secured three years' financing for a similar service, Keep Active Westminster, run in partnership with the NHS.

BCH continues to provide vital services for the most vulnerable and promotes independence, ranging from enabling people to find employment, to helping them to remain at home, avoiding residential care.

Community Centre

The Community Centre is open seven days a week until 10 pm, providing opportunities for people of all ages to come together for educational, cultural and social purposes. The Centre has four meeting rooms with fully accessible toilets and a kitchen area. Throughout the year, the Centre hosted nearly 1000 events and activities and 10 new groups used the facilities. In addition, BCH lets office space to charitable and private organisations.

Mentoring Plus

Mentoring Plus works with people with learning disabilities aged 16 and over, helping them gain new skills, build friendships, improve their education and literacy levels, enjoy social opportunities, undertake paid or voluntary work and training opportunities and enhance their physical and emotional wellbeing. The project offers a range of activities including: one-to-one mentoring, employment support, a literacy programme based largely on personal tuition, education workshops, health and wellbeing activities such as tai chi, and numerous social activities throughout the year.

During the year the project supported 105 adults with learning disabilities and worked with 43 volunteer mentors.

Homeline

Homeline is a volunteer delivered project aiming to reduce older people's isolation and improve health and well-being through befriending telephone calls and volunteer home visits. A team of 94 local volunteers made daily phone calls and home visits and helped Homeline staff host social events. Our project worker provided casework and advocacy support for those who need help with specific problems, completing over 800 pieces of casework, ranging from help with housing, care and financial issues to alerting emergency contacts when phone calls were not answered.

We supported 251 older people, with 43 new members joining the project. Our volunteers made around 17,000 telephone befriending

calls and we started new weekend phone calls in February 2016, calling 15 people each week. 82 older people received regular volunteer home visits with volunteers taking people out in wheelchairs, providing social contact and outdoor walking.

Keep Active Hammersmith & Fulham

Keep Active, a partnership project with Central London Community Healthcare NHS Trust, was launched in April 2013. It is funded by City Bridge Trust, in part to create a template for community support, replicable in other London boroughs.

Keep Active provides volunteers for nine weeks for older people who have lost some function due to illness, stroke or fall, helping them to get back to fitness. All clients, who are aged over 60 and recently discharged from hospital, come via the H & F Community Rehabilitation Team. 62 volunteers were active in the year, supporting 118 clients.

Keep Active is an essential service for H&F as a continuation of physical activity once a client has been discharged from an NHS community rehabilitation team. We feel reassured that clients are in good hands. E, physiotherapist

Keep Active Westminster

Building on the success of Keep Active Hammersmith & Fulham, Keep Active Westminster was launched in January 2016. It is a volunteer delivered project funded by public health monies and run in partnership with Central London Community Healthcare NHS. Keep Active Westminster offers 9 weeks' support to older people who need to build their confidence and mobility after discharge from hospital. In the first three months of the service, 9 volunteers supported 14 clients.

H&F Connect 55+

H&F Connect 55+ is a new befriending project that started in July 2015. Funded by LB Hammersmith & Fulham, the service helps to link older people to their communities through befriending and social events. 20 volunteers have offered befriending through home visits to 23 clients and telephone befriending calls have been made to 16 clients. We have provided 68 social events in sheltered housing schemes across the Borough, giving older people an opportunity to get out of their homes and meet new people. In March, H&F Connect started its first monthly trips using community transport.

Care & Repair: Adaptations for Life

Care & Repair promotes independent living by providing practical advice and support to help older and disabled people carry out adaptations to their homes so they can live independently.

We organise a wide range of adaptations, including wet floor showers, stair lifts, ramps and modified kitchens. This helps to take away much of the stress and anxiety associated with building work and the fear of being exploited by cowboy builders.

Our approved contractors complete the work to a high standard. We check if clients are eligible for a grant to assist with the cost of the work and we make the funding applications for them. This year we adapted the homes of 49 clients.

Safer Homes

Safer Homes carries out home safety, security and fire safety assessments in the homes of vulnerable residents. We provide advice and fit equipment to reduce the risk of accidents in the home, improve security and reduce the risk of domestic fires. During the year we visited 457 households helping a total of 984 residents and fitting 2,385 pieces of safety and security equipment. We installed draught proofing in 90 homes and carried out private work for 70 clients, which raised funds that were reinvested in the project. Safer Homes also ran 15 training and advice sessions.
